which flattered me, of course ...

and then he added: "I understand you are a Christian ... "

I hesitated a little, not quite knowing what to make of this, or how to respond immediately in a faculty group..... So, he went on, "You are a Christian, aren't you?"

And I said, "Yes, I am a Christian, but I'm not sure you and I would understand that term in the same way."

He responded, "oh, we could agree quickly on what it is to be a Christian ... "

I waited.

He said, "A Christian is one who is praying the last words of the New Testament fervently."

I looked at him.

He went on, "you do remember the last words of the New Testament, don't you?"

I acknowledged that I did. And then together we spake them, "Come quickly, Lord Jesus." And I went away realizing how I cite this encounter this morning because the Epistle lesson is in Shrewd his the same mode. expresses the same trush.

In our lesson, we are given a very interesting glimpse into the life of the Christians in Thessalonica, in the lst century, - thus, af that is, among first-generation Christians.

We can learn a lot about them simply by reading Paul's letters to them....

We understand, as I said, that they are first-generation Christians...

Their enthusiasms are still large and vital....

We can also gather that much of their education into matters religious has been supplied by St. Paul.

He had been with them on several earlier occasions...

and he is using this letter as a means of reminding them

of things he has already taught them...

It is also apparent that their initiation into the ways of the Christian faith was accompanied by a large dose of spirit-filled action..

There were RE ecstatic persons among them

Some had experienced what it is to be filled with the Spirit ...

If they were around today, we'd probably call them charismatics, we'd we'd probably suspect that they had had some exposure to pentecostalism...

For them, being a Christian was a very inward thing.

Intellectual understanding wouldn't have been exough.

They reallyfelt moved by the spirit.

when they became Christians. Make purel knowledge their ways radically when they became Christians. Make purel knowledge.

There are evidence that they were idol worshippers before, and that they have given up the idols now that they have become filled with the Spirit.

It is also apparent that a lot of them liked to party a lot....

There are references to previous wild orgies.

And some of them had even returned to former drinking practices ...

It also seems as if their parties provided for male-female exchanges of a rather free and even sordid nature....

The reason we can infer this is that some of them, after becoming Christians, thought it appropriate to avoid relations with members of the opposite sex altogether...

even marriage relationships....

Like with parties, orgies, akikk and drink, they felt this an area kow better left completely alone...

Then there is the element of hostility in the letters. to ulaboration that persons in the same area were hostile to the Christians...

They had suffered a lot because of their profession of Christian faith.

In other words, it wasn't easy to be the way they had become...

The environment didn't support their religious preferences...

They were a minority in the land....

a rather obvious minority...

Se, it was understandable that they had many questions

Not simply questions of clarification about things they had been taught...

but deep, x searching questions about what would happen next...

Because some didn't know what would happen next, they had drifted into idleness....

About these St. Paul said, "if a person doesn't work, he shouldn't be allowed to eat..."

And yet it was somewhat understandable that some among them would fall idle...

For the expectation was that Jesus would come again....

They thought rather soon.

If someone had happened on to the scene and had asked the Thessalonian Christians what they were doing, thekxwekki he would have heard them say, "well, we are waiting for Jesus to return..."

to return, to change everything, there isn't
much point in storing up treasures on earth.

The problem is that they had been waiting for some time, and they had begun to wonder if they had understood the situation properly...

Why hadn't Jesus come ...?

How long could they maintain their enthusiasms...?

**Whatxkekkix* How could they keep the expectation alive...?

In other words, they wanted a better sense of the sequence of things to come....

So kkexk they turned to their teacher for advice...

And to make matters worse, he was unable to come see
them, although he said that he really wanted to...

So they had to depend upon thema mails for answers
to these fundamental questions... This is background to
St.Paul's letter.

In the wade we have read, St. Paul

tells them first that they really don't need to know anything more about the times and seasons... when this will happen...

To get all of that schemed out in advance, to be able to predict days and times and hours, is to miss the point....

The event is to be a surprise ...

It will sheak up on them when they least expect it...

It will sheak them....

The day will come, Paul says, <u>like a thief in the night</u>...

But he does add that they can know something about the conditions

which might prompt the coming of that Day...

That is, when presprend that they have peace and security ... nothing to worry about any longer... then they should get worried, and remember that the day will come like a thief in the night...

They should ax also know that the day will be accompanied by a

But then he suddenly switches it from terror to comfort...

And he tells them to think of the coming of that day as according to another image than that of the thief sneaking up on them, or breaking in on them, in the middle of the night...

He says, in effect, but this is to use night imagery...

And then he goes on to reaffirm the message he told them from the beginning:

There are several lessons in it, I think, for us; or, perhaps, these are only some observations:

The first is simply to call attention to the commanding vision....
the expectation that the end is immanent...

... that they are living, as William Thompson might say, at the edge of history....

in the closing moments of time ...

Though the vision is never enunciated in full, we can perceive its influences:

It implies that there be no over-investment in the things of the world....

- -- no scheme and calculating about where we want to be at a certain stage of life....
- -- a very sober critique of the attempt to get our kicks from day to day successes....

You'll forgive me, I know, for thinking of President Ford in this regard....

Many of us wanted to love him when he came to office....

For it was to be an interim affair....

following a very difficult time

The country wasin in the mood to give him support even on a bi-partisan basis....

But the entire atmosphere changed when it became clear that President Ford became interested in his own future as President...

and that many of the decisions he is making at the moment are calculated to win more time to be president.

This, in a way, is the situation addressed by the text for the day;

The second observation concerns the encouragement Pakul gave the Thessalonians....

He calls them "children of the day" ... " sons of light...."
And he does this to comfort them...

to free them from worry...
to ease their minds....

He writes: "For God has not destined us for wrath, but to ghat obtain salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ."

He goes on, "He died for us -- that is, Christ died for us -- so that whether we wake or sleep we might live with him."

In other words, we are living with him now
His presence is with us even now....

The future need not be feared, for the way it will be is not that different from the way it is ...

For children of the light, to face the future is to witness the light shining brighter...

And it is the same light as that in which we are living now.

The Thessalonians have already been initiated into the mode of the future....

And the third observation is a teaser -
I would be remiss in not mentioning it....

I ask only that you think about it...

The teaser is that the Master is away.... We have the same thought in the Gospel lesson of today...

was here .. for a brief time .. then he went away...

but he'll be coming back, perhaps, very, very soon...

What do you make of it ... ?

It's not just that we are away ...
that is, away from home

like being on a pilgrimage

that we are in the process of journeying beyond and that we will one day return ...

No, it is the master who is away ...

Absent ... that is, not fully present ... - in medication

But present in a way ... in memory - in medication

Absent, but expected ... and, for the Thessalonians, and perhaps for some of us....

expected immanently....

As I said, I just ask you to consider this ...

I fully believe that Christianity wouldn't be what it is without this very important conviction....

And I suggest that it is testimony to our present incompleteness....

To me it says that even the most highly sensitized human

perspective

even the most accurately corrected perception of things ...

even our best intentions cannot put the pieces together....

that we seeme a

that is, if the Master is away ...

that the presence is

or if we really do feel, from time to time,

like motherless children ...

as the spiritual puts it...

It's as if the Master has to do something before he can return....

He's doing something too

perhaps, as the theological visionaries put it ...

"preparing the conditions to make his return possible..."

or, as I would like to put it

working creatively to facilitate his greater
eventual greater manifestation ...

greater manifestation ..

when God will be all in all ...

when the invisible will be visible
